BUSINESS RETENTION AND EXPANSION PROGRAM
May 7, 2015

Business retention and expansion (BRE) is one component of an economic development strategy that focuses on supporting and nurturing businesses in a community. By closely tracking local businesses, cities can both support growing companies and be aware of businesses that could downsize or leave. Sustaining and growing the businesses already in Vallejo can have significant economic benefit.

In 2012 the City Council adopted the Economic Development Strategic Plan and Strategic Marketing Plan. The intent of the Plan is to focus city resources to capture city-wide economic development opportunities and on processes and programs that can enhance city-wide economic growth. The intent of the Plan was to identify the overarching goals, objective and action plans to support economic development.

One of the goals identified in the Plan is to retain and expand existing businesses by establishing a business retention and expansion program. Recognizing that the majority of new job creation comes from existing businesses, it was determined that the existing BRE program needed to be better structured to provide high-leverage resources to support expansion of Vallejo businesses and resolve issues that negatively affect business vitality.

The components of the BRE program are to:

- Identify and track Vallejo's business community
- Develop a BRE survey to send to local businesses
- Direct liaison relationships with the City's largest employers
- Establish a coordinated BRE visitation program to assess the needs of existing companies in Vallejo and connect business owners and managers with resources to grow their businesses.
- Follow up to issues raised during site visit
- Develop information materials and resources to assist local businesses
- Business Resources and Partners

BRE TEAM MEMBERS

The BRE team will consist of an Economic Development Division staff member, a City Council member, a representative from the Economic Vitality Commission.

VALLEJO’S EXISTING BUSINESS BASE

The four large industry clusters in Vallejo identified in the 2012 Economic Strategic Plan are:

- Manufacturing and related industries that include metal products manufacturing, maritime industries, construction-related manufacturing (such as earthquake systems), and goods transportation, logistics and distribution.
- Tourism, which includes entertainment venues, hotels, and restaurants, and potentially tourism-related retail in the future.
- Healthcare and social assistance, which, includes healthcare providers, residential care facilities, and some limited life-science related research.
- Higher Education, which includes the four university and college systems operating in Vallejo (Touro University, California Maritime Academy, Solano Community College, and Sonoma State which offers classes at Solano Community College).

The City’s largest employers in 2014 and an approximation of number of employees are:

RELATIONSHIPS WITH LARGEST EMPLOYERS

Staff will continue to work closely with the three institutions of higher education in their efforts to grow their campuses and to identify the City of Vallejo as a College Town and collaborate with the Unified School District to prepare students for the workforce through the Wall to Wall Academy Advisory Board. Staff will team with Kaiser Permanent Medical Center and Sutter Solano Medical Center to reinforce their contribution of addressing the healthcare needs of the region, and assist Six Flags Discovery Kingdom in its effort to expand. Staff will meet with Petrochem and the California Highway Patrol annually.

BUSINESS RETENTION SURVEY

Understanding the specific needs of businesses can often be problematic. To assist with ascertaining the needs of the business in the community, a survey will be prepared and sent to local businesses. Responses from these surveys may provide early warnings of businesses that may need assistance, may be thinking of relocating to out of the city, or may be thinking of expansion.

The survey results may help to identify strategies for economic development and design a comprehensive business retention and expansion program that combine various tools targeted at improving local business environment.

SITE VISITS

Staff proposes a program of structured Business Retention site visits by a team of staff, City Councilmembers and Economic Vitality Commission members. Councilmembers and Commissioners reaching out to local businesses in their official capacity will educate the BRE team of the needs and concerns of businesses in the community and developing a positive communication process between the business community and the City of Vallejo.

Retention visits will be made by the BRE team to:

- Demonstrate to existing businesses that the community appreciates their contribution to the local economy
- To help existing businesses solve current and potential problems
- Assist local businesses in gaining awareness of available resources
- Encourage expansion that lead to sustainable job growth

The retention visit may include tour of the company facilities to help the BRE team get an in-depth understanding of what the business does and establish deeper rapport with the business owner.

The frequency of the retention visits by the BRE team will be twice a month. The BRE team will have standard questions to ask at each site visit.

Informal site visits will be made by the Economic Development Division staff member to:

- Recently owned businesses
- Neighborhood businesses
- Businesses with recent reinvestments

These informal site visits are to establish a relationship with these businesses and to provide assistance when needed. The frequency of the informal visits may be one a week. Handouts of useful information may be provided at these visits.

BUSINESS TO TARGET FOR VISITATION

It is recommended that the retention visits target businesses with the following profile:

- High growth businesses, identified through sales tax figures
- Businesses that exist within one of the four industry sectors that drive Vallejo's economic vitality (manufacturing, tourism, health care, and higher education)
- Businesses that add quality jobs
- Businesses with over 50 employees

VISITATION FOLLOW UP

Prepare a letter thanking the business for taking the time to meet with the BRE team and address any concerns that were raised during the visitation. After the visit, the business is encouraged to contact city staff when assistance as needed.

TRAINING OF BRE TEAM MEMBERS

Since few people have extensive experience in conducting interviews, it is essential to offer training to the BRE team members. Most business owners and managers are reluctant to share business information. In order to obtain the information necessary for a successful BRE effort, owners and managers must be assured of the confidentiality of the data. BRE team members must be committed to confidentiality in order to be able to gain accurate data and the respect of the business community. Staff will provide training to the Economic Vitality Commissioners.

BUSINESS RESOURCES AND PARTNERS

Grow Vallejo Fund

The Grow Vallejo Fund is a unique economic development partnership between the National Development and Grow America Fund, Inc. (GAF). Through the Grow Vallejo Fund, eligible small businesses in the City of Vallejo may apply for loans from \$50,000 to \$2,000,000 at competitive rates, floating or fixed, for a term of up to 25 years. In order to qualify for these loans, the businesses must be engaged in a legitimate for-profit business activity and have the ability to create permanent jobs in the community.

Governor's Office of Business and Economic Development (GO-Biz) Initiatives

- Manufacturing Equipment + Sales & Use Tax Exemption – Sales tax exemption that eliminates California portion of sales tax (4.19%)
- California Competes Credit – Income tax credit negotiated between GO-Biz and businesses that want to come to California or stay and grow in California.
- New Employment Credit – Credit based on wages above \$12 an hour and up to \$28 an hour (or above \$10 an hour base in limited pilot areas) Maximum credit amount is \$56,000 per employee (5-year total, 2,000 hours). Employee qualifications are persons unemployed 6 months, veterans within one year of separation, Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) recipients, ex-offenders and recipients of CalWorks or general assistance.

Solano Community College Small Business Development Center

Solano Community College Small Business Development Center (SBDC) provides technical assistance (e.g. business planning, operations, accounting, financing, marketing, and other small business development issues), and conducts a variety of workshops and training programs for Vallejo businesses and residents.

Solano Economic Development Corporation

The Solano Economic Development Corporation assists the City in attracting, growing, and retaining businesses and industry that will enhance the economic vitality and quality of life within the community.

Chambers of Commerce

The four chambers of commerce assist the City with economic development, to support quality of life for businesses and residents, and create jobs.

POLICY RECOMMENDATIONS

Through all of the BRE functions, the ED Division will be learning the needs of Vallejo businesses, identifying trends and hearing requests for new services or changed policies. Actively and regularly working with business will aid City officials and staff in recommending programs or policies to promote business and job growth for Vallejo.

SUPPORTING MATERIALS

Information Packet

Compile a packet of information from various city departments and economic development partners to leave with the businesses. Encourage businesses to sign up for E-Subscriptions on the City's website to receive city newsletters, reports, press releases, and agendas.

SUBJECT: 2015-2016 ECONOMIC VITALITY COMMISSION (EVC) WORK PROGRAM

The purpose of this memorandum is to outline the Economic Vitality Commission's (EVC) Work Program from May 2015 to May 2016. The EVC will assist with two major initiatives: the Business Retention & Expansion Program and the Propel Vallejo process.

Both initiatives align with the three purposes for the EVC as outlined in the Vallejo Municipal Code Chapter 2.36:

1. To advise the city council on issues that can enhance job growth and increased private investment in Vallejo;
2. To review and assist with updates and the implementation of the economic development element of the general plan; and
3. To assist with business retention and attraction activities.

Business Retention & Expansion

At the May 13, 2015 meeting, the EVC will receive an overview of the Business Retention & Expansion Program launching this month. Interested commissioners will have the opportunity to participate in visits with Vallejo business over the coming months.

Propel Vallejo

The EVC has been engaged with the Propel Vallejo effort starting in the prior year, including three commission meetings to date: September 10, 2014, January 26, 2015 and April 27, 2015. The latter two meetings were joint meetings with the General Plan Working Group. Staff anticipates the EVC will meet an additional three to five times in the next year approximately for a total of seven to nine meetings during the Propel Vallejo process.

The EVC will continue to review and make recommendations to the General Plan Working Group on portions of the General Plan directly related to economic development. In particular, the EVC provides significant contributions in recommending policies that can incentivize job growth and business investment in Vallejo. Through the fall of 2015, the EVC will provide input related to the Preferred Future Scenario. After the Preferred Future Scenario is selected, the EVC will focus on the "Economy, Education & Training" chapter of the General Plan, which contains the "economic development element."

Meeting Schedule

Based on the two major initiatives described above, staff have developed a tentative schedule for upcoming noticed meetings of the EVC, shown below. Please note that the meeting schedule above does not encompass all EVC activities.
